## Celebrating the Life of Terry Sargent







Terry Sargent, 66, of Ann Arbor, MI, died peacefully surrounded by family on November 3, 2014. Terry was born on July 31, 1948 in Bay City, MI. He grew up in Midland, attended Bay City High School and enjoyed helping out on the farm and playing football. Terry then went to the University of Michigan to pursue his Bachelors of Architecture (class of 1971) and continued on to receive his Masters of Urban Planning (class of 1973). During his time in this program, he met his wife, Jean Wineman.

Terry and Jean moved to Atlanta, GA, where Terry established the architecture firm Lord & Sargent, later becoming Lord, Aeck & Sargent, with fellow architects Larry Lord and Tony Aeck. The firm currently has offices in six cities including Ann Arbor, which he opened in 2001. Terry was a gifted designer and valued mentor. His expertise earned him over 50 awards including two National American Institute of Architects (AIA) Honor Awards, three Progressive Architecture Design Awards, and more than 30 regional and local AIA awards. Some of his most notable works include: Trinity School, Atlanta, GA; Zoo Atlanta Conservation Center; Duke University Genome Sciences Building; Georgia Public Health Laboratory; National Parks Service Twin Creek Science Center; University of Michigan Law Library Restoration; and University of Michigan Memorial Phoenix Laboratory, Terry was recognized with a Lifetime Achievement Award from the Huron Valley AIA in the fall of last year.

Outside of work, Terry enjoyed golf, basketball, skiing and other outdoor activities such as fly fishing, camping and hiking. He also enjoyed weekends in the mountains and adventurous vacations with his wife and daughters. He was a loving husband to his wife, Jean, and a devoted father to his daughters and their families: Lindsey and AJ Reisinger, Kelsey Sargent and John Egge, Maisie Sargent and Robbie Auld. He was important to the lives of: his parents, Don and Evelyn Sargent; his sisters, Debbie Purcell and Valery Sargent and their families; his parents-in-law, the late Peg and Bob Wineman; his siblings-in-law, Janet Wineman, the late Barbara Wineman, Marian Wineman, and Tom Wineman and their families. He will be missed by all, and his memory will live on through the places he created.
